MOTORING HERITAGE DAY SUNDAY 12 MARCH 1995

- Motoring Heritage Day is an annual fundraising event for the Leukaemia Foundation of Queensland.
- 2 The event is organised by the Queensland Combined Council of Historic Vehicle Clubs and the Leukaemia Foundation of Queensland.
- Motoring Heritage Day 1995 will begin at 9.00am with a police escorted rally from the Queensland Police and Emergency Services Academy, Rudd Street, Oxley, proceeding along the Ipswich Motorway to the Amberley Air Base, (using the Old Toowoomba Road entrance). ETA: 10.00am.
- 4 More than 300 car enthusiasts will gather at the Amberley Air Base to display their vehicles and compete for prizes.
- Vintage, veteran, classic and historic vehicles including commercial vehicles, motor cycles, cars, street machines, special interest vehicles, steam vehicles and engines, and machinery will take part.
- Each class of vehicle will be judged and prizes awarded, including the Kimble Blessing Perpetual Trophy for the Best Represented Club. The Trophy is named after Kimble Blessing who died of leukaemia in 1979, aged seven.
- 7 Entertainment will include a gymkhana, vintage car rides, Harley Davidson rides, and drag racing.
- There will be a market square with lots of craft stalls as well as a variety of food and drinks available. The family entertainment area will include rides and games for the children.
- 9 Public entry is only \$5 adults, \$2 children/pensioners.
- Funds raised will go towards meeting the cost of the new \$4 million accommodation and support centre at South Brisbane for leukaemia patients and their families from rural and remote parts of Queensland who have to come to Brisbane for life-saving medical treatment.



If it goes to the top of the red, run.

An over-heating engine is not uncommon.
But in a worse case scenario, an engine can overheat so badly that major reconditioning or a new engine can be required.

Two components crucial to the car's cooling stem are the water pump and the thermostat.

The job of the water pump is to circulate coolant through the engine and through the radiator.

The coolant is generally water or a mixture of water and some other substance.

Water pumps are generally taken for granted until something goes wrong, like a slack or broken fan belt or, more expensively, a leaking seal on the water pump shaft which nearly always calls for a new pump.

Either of these can cause overheating.

Or it can be a pump bearing failure which causes a loud growling noise at the front of the engine, or a corroded impellor or pump ,housing, most often caused by a faulty radiator cap which is not giving positive pressure at the inlet of the water pump.

The thermostat is designed to set the minimum engine operating temperature and to be fully open at a slightly higher temperature.

Once it is fully open, the only limit to the maximum engine temperature is radiator performance.

The temperature gauge is your best diagnostic tool to determine thermostat performance but is of little value if it is not checked often.

If the thermostat needle reads lower than than normal even when the car has had time to warm upnot a serious problemchange the thermostat at your convenience.

If the needle rises very quickly - often in less than three kilometres - change the thermostat as a matter of urgency.

Perhaps the greatest problem with thermostats is that they can be very temperamental, working well one day and all over the place the next.

When you experience erratic swings, change your thermostat.

It is a good idea to carry a thermostat housing gasket in your car. They are very cheap and can be protected inside the back cover of your street directory.

If your thermostat fails in some out-of-the-way spot, it is a simple matter to remoit and having the gasket just makes the job of sealing the housing that much easier.

ROUTE; WINDSOR TO WAGGA WAGGA VIA LIGHTNING RIDGE DATE; START 8/10/94 FROM WINDSOR FINISH 15/10/1994 WAGGA WAGGA DISTANCE; 2620 KM ALL VEHICLES ELIGABLE FOR THE EVENT MUST BE PRE-1980 EXCLUDING 4 WHEEL DRIVES,UTES AND MOTORCYCLES

MOST EVENTS SUCH AS THIS ALWAYS START WITH A FUNCTION THE EVENING BEFORE THE EVENT.IN THIS CASE IT WAS AT THE MAQUARIE ARMS HOTEL AT WINDSOR WHERE ABOUT 150 PEOPLE GATHERED FOR THE PRE-RALLY DINNER.

DAY ONE: WINDSOR TO TAREE 395.9 KM

NEXT MORNING EVERYONE GATHERED BACK AT THE HOTEL FOR BREAKFAST AND THE START OF THE RALLY (CAPER) IN THE MAIN STREET OF WINDSOR. THE START WAS IN ORDER OF COLOR GROUPS IN WHICH THERE WERE FOUR.

PRE-DETERMINED BY AGE OF VEHICLES. THE P-76'S BEING IN THE RED COLOR GROUP.

AFTER LEAVING WINDSOR WE COULD ENJOY A QUIET RUN UP TO WILBURFORCE AND COLO BEFORE STARTING ON THE 1ST CHASE OF THE CAPER. THE FIRST DIRT SECTION PUT EVERYBODY INTO "RALLY MODE" AND FINALLY FOR US ALLOWED US TO SEE JUST HOW THE CAR HANDLED AND PREFORMED ON DIRT.

WE WERE ONLY A FEW HOURS INTO THE FIRST DAY AND 761 WAS STARTING TO PLAY UP.WE HAD NO POWER DOWN LOW AND EVERYTIME WE BACKED OFF THE CAR WOULD BACKFIRE; SO LUKE HAD TO TRY AND KEEP THE REVS UP HIGH TO MAKE THE CAR DRIVABLE. THIS ONLY LASTED A SHORT TIME BEFORE IT BECAME INTOLERABLE AND WE PULLED OVER TO TRY AND REPAIR THE PROBLEM.

WE CHANGED POINTS, CONDENSOR AND ADJUSTED THE TIMING BUT TO NO AVALE, THE CAR WAS STILL RUNNING LIKE A "DOG".WE COULDN'T AFFORD TO LOSE ANY MORE TIME AND SO STRUGGLED ON TO TRY AND COMPLETE THE FIRST DAY. JUST AFTER 6 pm WE ARRIVED IN TAREE FOR THE FIRST NIGHT OF PARTYING.

DINNER AND ENTERTAINMENT WERE HELD AT THE TAREE R.S.L CLUB. AFTER SOME DINNER, DRINKS AND RECEIVING OUR INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE NEXT DAY WE HEADED ACROSS THE ROAD TO THE LOCAL PUB WERE OUR SLEEPING QUARTERS QUIET CONVENIENTLY LOCATED.

DAY 2: TAREE TO NARRABRI

TRYING TO GET UP WAS HARD THAT MORNING. THE CAPER CREWS LIKE TO PARTY HARD INTO THE EARLY HOURS AND I DIDN'T FEEL TO GOOD AFTER ONLY A COUPLE OF HOURS SLEEP. FIRST STOP WAS THE LOCAL SPARE PARTS PLACE AND WE PURCHASED A FEW BITS TO TRY AND GET THE CAR RUNNING RIGHT. AFTER BREAKFAST AT THE POLICE BOYS CLUB, WE SET SAIL FOR THE WINGHAM SHOWGROUND FOR THE MOBIL-FORD DEALER MOTORKHANA ORANISED BY THE MANNING DISTRICT CAR CLUB. IT TURNED OUT TO BE A NIGHTMARE FOR US BECAUSE THE CAR WAS STILL RÜNNING LIKE A DOG AND NOT MATTER WHAT WE DID IT JUST MADE THE PROBLEM WORSE. WE PUSHED ON ALYWAY JUST HOPING TO FINISH THE DAY, THEN WORRY ABOUT FIXING THE CAR.

WE WERE ABOUT 25 KAYS INTO THE FIRST CHASE WHEN ALL HELL BROKE LOOSE. THE CAR WAS BACKFIRING AND IT WAS ALMOST IMPOSSIBLE TO DRIVE AND WHILE FLYING DOWN THE WRONG DIRT ROAD WE HAD RUN OUT OF BRAKES. GOING BACK DOWN THE GEARS AND USING THE HAND BRAKE WE MANAGED TO STOP THE CAR WITHOUT HITTING ANYONE OR THING. WE MANAGED TO STOP THE CAR WAS ON FIREIMIII. I SPEND \$15.00 AND 5 HOURS THAT NIGHT IN NARRABRI TRYING TO GET THE SMELL OUT OF MY CLOTHES PUTTING THEM THROUGH THE WASH 4 TIMES AND TO THIS DAY I CAN STILL SMELL THAT BURNT NYLON
