Working together over the phone on electrical trouble shooting.

For years now I reread the articles by Dr Phil, and was impressed with his simple approach to everything on the P76, especially the electrical wiring and his remarks about how the "wire in the loom" captures or holds the "smoke".

For the last couple of days I have been assisting Graham, a Queensland club member in tracing the electrical circuits in his Leyland P76 car. I was thinking about Dr Phil on the way the smoke is held as we traced the wires. Did not need to have amoke appear.

Graham was sitting in or walking around the car as I was reading the circuit diagram from the workshop manual. We conversed on the phone. Both Graham and I have learnt a lot about the P76 electrical loom and the way the light switch and associated circuits work. The book is very accurate but for the life of me I can not identify the circuit going to the centre console for the T bar - it has to be off the parking light circuit.

The conclusion is that we identified how the lighting and light switch works, the boot and glove box wiring and the interior light. As we could not find the wire going to the T bar console we checked the compliance plate to find that his car was originally a column shift automatic and not a T bar. Graham is going to have to run a wire from the parking light circuit, not the dash lights to fix his problem.

Graham can now finish off the interior of his car. I look forward in seeing this car at club outings soon.

Rosewood Railway Museum Club Run June 2011 by Adrian Spencer

Those who attended the June Club run to the Rosewood Railway Museum were Carle, Andrew and Louise and their children, Bob and Joyce, Ann and Richard, Stan and Margaret, Richard R, Darryl and Barbie, Neville and Travis and Adrian. A great turn out. The rail yard is located in the hills behind Rosewood in South East Queensland, on part of an old spur track that has been maintained by the local Rail Historical Society. The track runs for about 3 kms across the spur that was 14 kms and they have set up a museum at one end and old station at the other.

The train engine sits on the platform with carriages made up of mixed First Class and Second Class. Then when it gets to the other end the engine and carriages are decoupled. The engine heads off around the corner where it returns on another track, passes the carriages and then returns and switches back to the carriage track from the other direction to recouple. This takes about 5 minutes and then you head back to where you started.



They have other rolling stock as well as a museum, canteen and ticket office. When you pay your money you get an original ticket. Quite reasonably priced at \$8 for the ride and every thing else is free (except of course the food).

You could think you were Harry Potter going to Hogworts on this train. It gives you time to contemplate the late 19th and early 20th Century and how people moved about. Slow but faster than walking, riding or any other transport of the time.
