Friday 22 April 2011

Route: Gold Coast to Beaudesert via Yatala, to Aratula via Boonah, to Glenn Innes, to Inverell travelling on the Cunningham Highway, New England Highway and the Gwydir Highway.

Richard and I left home in our Omega Navy Targa at 7.30am on Good Friday and met Warren and Garth at BP Coomera. They were travelling in Warren's Omega Navy Targa. We cruised to Macdonald's Beaudesert for breakfast and Adrian and Jenny arrived in their Ford Falcon. Adrian was very unhappy as his "P" did not want to go to Inverell even after him putting a new radio in. It wouldn't start so he was forced to use alternate transport. Not sure Adrian, how the radio affected the car as it wouldn't start but maybe the car just didn't like this new piece of equipment and prefers your singing instead. It looked like it was going to be a very long weekend with Adrian's long face. However, after a lot of ribbing from the boys for travelling in a Ford to a P76 weekend he finally relented and managed a smile and we continued on our way to Aratula. Here we met up with Darryl and Barbi in their Bitter Apricot Deluxe. With the three Ps and the falcon we set off in convoy towards Warwick on the Cunningham Highway.

We soon found out that most of the Gold Coast and Brisbane travellers had the same idea to travel our route. There were road works as we meandered up the range at a slow, stop, slow, stop pace and we realised that we were not going to arrive in Inverell at our scheduled time. The day was warm and sunny and the cars queued in front and behind us. A couple of times when we stopped we stretched our legs and had a chat. Our Targa decided that it didn't want to go any further after one of the stops. I had turned the motor off when we were stopped and the fuel was not pumping through therefore creating vapour lock. We do not have an electric petrol pump which would have helped the situation. I managed to pull over to the side with Adrian pulling up behind us and let all the other hundreds of vehicles go. We somehow pushed the car which was facing uphill to turn it around to face downhill while holding up the line of traffic. The traffic wasn't going anywhere at that stage. Once we had it facing downhill we managed to get it started again, backed up to a layby and turned it around. We got back into the line of traffic and drove slowly up over the range (with me praying all the way that the queue of cars did not stop). We were fortunate that the traffic controller let us go through without stopping and we were able to get to the top and cruise down to the servo on the other side of the range to meet up with the other two Ps. A guest speaker entertained the audience about the war days and what Inverell contributed to this effort. The afternoon was free time and some of us checked out the local RSM – taste testing the food and drinks. They passed the test. Others cruised on back to the camp to chill out. That evening about a dozen of us were picked up by the RSM bus and then went there for tea. It was crowded and we queued for our meal. We had trouble getting a table for all of us and managed to get two leaners close together. Those who stayed back in camp had a BBQ. The evening finished up in Barbi and Daryl's cabin with a lot of laughter.

Sunday 24 April 2011

Warren and Garth left camp early to head back to the Gold Coast. A few of us had another BBQ breakfast and then we left camp and met at Pioneer Village where we had 10 Ps displayed. The local photographer from the Inverell Times was there and did a photo shoot of the cars for an article to be in the paper on Tuesday.



Pioneer Village is spread over a large area of land and had an old church, school, hotel, shop and other buildings reminiscent of the old days. All these buildings were full of household items and working tools etc that were used back in the 1800s. This was a great display and well looked after.
